

Ringing in Unity

As a conductor, I don't ring as much as I once did and I enjoy opportunities to get on the other side of the table from time to time. I occasionally ring as a sub in the adult choir at my church (which I do not conduct) and had the privilege of attending the 13th International Handbell Symposium with them this summer. It was great to "sharpen the saw" as a ringer and provided some much needed insight regarding a ringer's perspective. It also reminded me that "Music expresses that which cannot be put into words and cannot remain silent." (Victor Hugo)

More than 800 ringers from the United States, Japan, Puerto Rico, Singapore, and the United Kingdom gathered in Orlando, Florida, for five days of ringing with conductors who represented handbell guilds from Canada, Korea, Japan, Australasia, the United Kingdom, and the United States. The event began with some pageantry and celebration. Flags and representatives of the various handbell guilds paraded in (much like the Olympic ceremonies but shorter!), speeches were made (including a short welcome in Japanese by AGEHR's President, Debbie Rice!), and Ring of Fire set the tone with a short and inspiring concert conducted by Jason Wells. We were all excited and ready to begin.

During our first rehearsal we worked with all of the conductors for a few minutes. In addition to making introductions I'm sure that both ringers and conductors experienced a reality check: we are going to have to work hard to get 800 ringers to sound like one ensemble. We also realized that we would need patience as instructions were sometimes translated into one or more languages. In addition to massed ringing we had opportunities to take classes related to handbell ringing

and/or cultures. Imagine learning about bell trees in one class and then later that day experiencing children's games from Japan!

One of the highlights of the week was the solo concerts. Each day, several ensembles presented prepared pieces for the rest of the participants. Many groups performed pieces that were still in manuscript or arranged specifically for this event. I enjoyed the diversity of pieces, especially when the pieces represented the culture of the performers, as was the case with a high school ensemble from Singapore that wore traditional dress and performed a piece that incorporated traditional Malaysian tunes. A group from Puerto Rico had the entire audience tapping toes and bobbing heads along with their infectious Latin rhythms. The addition of percussion and electric bass rounded out this unique performance.

Seated lunches and dinners provided us with opportunities to meet people from other parts of the world. At any meal you might have ringers from the U.S., Japan and Puerto Rico at the same table, comparing their experiences. One evening was set aside for a dessert and "trinket exchange"—a time when everyone mingles, makes new friends, and gives small gifts (pins, pencils/pens, fans, origami, postcards, buttons and more) to one another. I collected several mementos that will help me recall the new friends I made during that week.

The week concluded with a closing concert attended by 600 guests. From the opening fanfare of Carmina Burana to the closing jazzy conclusion of an American Tapestry, the concert was thrilling for both performers and listeners alike. Each participant received a CD of the concert and I listened

to it in the car the next day. That was the moment I realized that both Wadsworth and Hugo were correct; music is a means of communicating when words are inadequate.

We may not all speak English, Japanese, Korean or Spanish, but we understand when we all work together to create a crescendo, ritardando or silent moment. We understand working together to create a mood, a moment, or a memory in music. How rewarding it is to create sound together that is both accurate and expressive, especially when that sound represents the unity of all mankind (The Bells in My Heart). We certainly achieved the theme of the event: Ringing in Unity, and I look forward to my next International Handbell Symposium.

Schoolpop Has Joined OneCause

When Concert Bells began, we were a member of Scrip. One bought certificates and then used these to buy merchandise in stores. CBFW received a small donation for each purchase of certificates.

After a few years, Scrip went out of business and we joined Schoolpop, which focused on online and charged purchases. Though Schoolpop was intended chiefly for schools, as the name suggests, it included a few other non-profit organizations like Concert Bells. The Schoolpop website kept saying that scrip-like certificates were coming soon as an option, but they never materialized.

Now Schoolpop has joined OneCause. Organizations that can benefit from OneCause include both schools and "causes," that is, non-profits in fields other than education. OneCause operates exclusively with charged and online purchases. Certificates are not part of the mix.

As with Scrip and then Schoolpop, Concert Bells receives a small donation for every purchase you make via the OneCause website, which links to many online shopping websites, or with a charge card that is registered at the OneCause site.

All our information and all our supporters' information at the Schoolpop website migrated over to OneCause. If you had a Schoolpop login and password, that same login and password work on OneCause. If you had registered charge cards at Schoolpop, those cards are still registered at OneCause

Before you go shopping with charge cards or when you begin a session of online shopping, go to OneCause (www.onecause.com or www.schoolpop. com) and sign up. Look for us under Arts & Culture. Designate Concert Bells of Fort Worth as the "cause" that you are supporting. The website is easy to use, and Concert Bells will benefit from the shopping you would have done anyway.
